Apropos

We are blessed in this country to have a universal health care system, which is accessible to all Canadians. We know that it is not perfect and that there is a constant balancing act going on between affordability and access. One area that deserves much more scrutiny, however, is the question of accessibility to mental health services. A number of years ago, we closed most of our residential facilities in this province designed for special needs patients. The closure of the Rideau Regional Centre in 2009, which housed more than 2,000 patients in Smiths Falls is a prime local example. Leaving aside the question of whether these institutions were the best places for the residents they housed, the fact remains that we removed significant resources from the area of mental health care without an adequate replacement.

Today we are paying the price for not investing sufficient resources into mental health. It is now often extremely difficult for those with mental health issues to get adequate assistance through our universal health care system. Wait times are extremely long, which often exacerbates the patients' problems. It is next to impossible for those with alcohol or other substance abuse issues to get the treatment they so desperately need, unless they have the resources required to pay for it themselves. We see the cost of this inadequate resourcing daily in the crime stories that dominate the news. Far too often it seems that our police forces are called upon to deal with mental health and substance abuse issues under the guise of criminal activity and even terrorism. The cost is readily apparent in terms of the significant increase in the total prison population and the disproportionate number of people with mental health and substance abuse issues who are incarcerated in prisons at great public expense, without appropriate treatment for the issues that put them there. There is a less readily apparent, but very real, cost in terms of job loss, under-utilization and societal dislocation. Five years ago, the Mental Health Commission of Canada completed a detailed study that indicated that the economic cost to Canada from mental health problems is at least \$50 billion a year (click here to see the report). It concluded that there is strong evidence to support the argument that investing in effective programs can make a positive difference both to the economy and to the health of the population. Five years on, the question still remains: would it not be better to invest more adequately in appropriate universal mental health services at the front end, rather than paying the significantly higher cost at the back end?


