Far too often we're mesmerized by the comings and goings of so-called "celebrities". The genius of John McKenty is to help us see how our own local citizens make our lives not just interesting but more meaningful.

His latest book on the Christie Lake community, "Arden Blackburn's Mail Route" is a hymn to the power of one person acting as both communicator and servant to help give neighbours a sense of place and each other.

In today's internet and globalized world the magical blend of permanent residents and summer vacationers that was Christie Lake is something we are envious of. Unlike today's CEOs, whose lives are most often lived in total

separation from "ordinary people", the president of the CPR and many of his top executives were members of the lake community. As they gathered to work, play, and celebrate the beauty that was around them, the neighbours came to transcend politics, religion and sometimes even family. All was not always tranquil at the lake as the history of Christie Lake Mines Limited and the tragic death of Arden's own son Lindsay attest.


